He's an elected member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, a college professor, and a past president of the Native American Journalists Association. Indigenous journalists make up less than 1% of professional reporters in the U.S.

ICT is growing that number by offering internships to aspiring media professionals, mentoring young reporters, and providing growth opportunities to seasoned newsroom leaders.

A 2022 report by the Pew Research Center identified 134 reporters who cover tribal governments for 44 media outlets, representing 29 different tribal groups.

Of the 37 reporters cited who work for digital media outlets, 32 report for ICT.

How We're Changing the Landscape

We've hired more Indigenous journalists than any other newsroom in America. Of ICT's more than 30 employees, 70% are Native. 100% of ICT's Board of Directors are Native.

American Indians and Alaska Natives make up approximately 3% of the U.S. population, at 9.7 million people. Our stories provide historical and regional context to major issues facing Native America, including health care, education, treaty rights, climate change, land rights, and language revitalization.



PAVING THE WAY FOR EMERGING LEADERS IN INDIGENOUS MEDIA AND JOURNALISM

Our mission is to provide Indigenous talent with a viable career path to become leaders in journalism. Our team already boasts some of the best and brightest that Indian Country has to offer. And we're just getting started. We have big goals and with your help, we can get there.

MEET JOURDAN.

Jourdan Bennett-Begaye is a Diné citizen and serves as our Deputy Managing Editor. Originally, Jourdan almost pursued a career in public health after an internship with the Center for Disease Control. She decided to get her Masters in journalism after connecting with the Native American Journalists Association, which she was recently elected to serve as a board member. At Indian Country Today, Jourdan spearheaded the development of ICT's COVID-19 Tracker which tracks coronavirus cases in Indian Country by tribe. This work has been nationally recognized by institutions such as UCLA and ASU, and led to a partnership with Johns Hopkins University where a team of 30 student volunteers actively maintain the data feeds.

As we look to a bright, robust future of growth and development, we are excited to continue working toward our goal of 100 Native-focused donors and organizational partners to seed the growth of our reach and impact.


